state of the European Union," Falzon told some 500 hunters at a meeting organised by Labour MP Charles Buhagiar at Ray's Auto Dealer in Zebbug.

Malta's legal obligations under the Birds Directive include the immediate cessation of hunting in Spring.

"Should the EC institute legal proceedings against Malta before we are in government, we will continue to follow the case, with our aim being (obviously) that of winning. We will, however, abide by the decision of the European Court, whatever that may be."

Falzon also hinted that hunters would not return to the "free-forall" scenario they used to enjoy in years gone by, claiming that law enforcement will remain a priority for his party. However, he promised that bona fide hunters will not be "persecuted like criminals" under a Labour administration

"Enforcement of the relevant laws, both local and European, is important and will remain and if need be improved; and nobody can expect to break the law and get away with it," Falzon warned. "Hunters and trappers are to

enjoy all civil rights apertaining to their fellow citizens in Malta, as well as to other hunters within the European Union. Any sense of 'vindictiveness' currently felt by hunters is not to remain.

BirdLife ranger shot in the face

THE ranger of the Foresta 2000 site in Mellieha, Ray Vella, was shot in the face by a hunter while tending to his own field in Wied il-Mizieb, BirdLife said yesterday.

Vella, a long-time member of BirdLife, has been the ranger of the Foresta 2000 site in Mellieha for the last four years personally tending to the trees, near the Red Tower where 3,000 trees were damaged by vandals last May.

On Monday afternoon at 5:52pm, Vella had just arrived



at his field and was tending to his land when a hunter shot in his direction from a distance of around 35 metres. "I was hit in the face in several places and shouted out in pain, making it clear to the hunter that I was hit," said Vella.

The hunter in turn aggressively shouted back at me, swearing at me and cursing BirdLife, clearly showing that he knew who I was. He then ran off, while taunting me over his shoulder to call the

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Fuel market liberalised

APPLICATIONS for operating licences for petroleum imports were yesterday opened by the Malta Resources Authority in one of the final steps towards the effective liberalisation of the petroleum market.

It represents another step away from the monopoly so far enjoyed by Enemalta Corporation, after the independent regulator was set up to monitor petroleum operations and oversee market liberalisation. The applications cover oper-

ating licences for petroleum

imports and wholesale, and operation of a primary storage facility.

The MRA said all efforts will be made to ensure an expeditious consideration of applications.

'The consumer is the main focus of this liberalisation. All operators should be aware the consumer deserves and expects upgrading of standards, not least where quality, price of service rendered and safety in operations are concerned."







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
